

Greeting you all the Peace of our Risen Lord. Alleluia! Allelulia!

The event of the Resurrection of our Lord is the singular truth that formed the foundation of our Christian faith. There is Christianity because of the truth of the Resurrection. That is why, it is of logical weight to say that the resurrection is not a product of the faith of the Apostles; it is rather the faith of the Apostles which is a product of the Resurrection of our Lord. It is essentially the resurrection of Jesus that early Christians became bold enough to proclaim that "Jesus is Lord!" – because to rise from the dead is completely a divine action.

Faith in the risen Lord is not something we can explain just by way of retelling the story of the resurrection, but by way of resurrecting also our actions of faith, hope and love which might have died along with our weaknesses and limitations. It can become entirely pointless to celebrate Easter Season if we fail to recreate the life-giving values of the resurrection in our relationships with the family, neighbours, friends and workmates. In fact, if there is any spirituality, we Christians must value the most, it is the spirituality of the resurrection; always attuned to newness, fullness, rebirth, hopefulness and faithfulness. This is one reason why in this sacred season of Christ's Resurrection, we are called to promote and protect the dignity of the human life, especially the unborn. Easter time is also a Sacred Season which calls us to stand up for life; to help defend the rights of the offenders to face sanctions that lead to their conversion and not to their execution.

May we all seek to be blessed with the spirit of Easter to increase our fervours to know, to love and to serve the Lord. Let our dailies be as bright and warm as the joy of the resurrection; because the Resurrection is not a past event, but always a present event. That is why we say: "Christ IS Risen"; we do not say "Christ was Risen." This is to think that even the grammar is a perfect indication of the truth of the Resurrection. It is not a past perfect tense; it is a present perfect tense. Meaning, that the resurrection already happened and it continues to happen until now; so must it be in our thoughts and actions.



POSTULANCY FORMATION UPDATE

My Postulancy Experience

My postulancy experience has been quite a transition from a comfortable, financially independent life as a practicing medical professional with a strong family responsibility to take care of my parents who have long since passed, to a structured religious life that by itself calls for a renunciation of non-essentials in my committed pursuit of the religious life. It has been a constant adjustment to daily community life requiring discipline, diligence, patience, and humility stretched to the limits by our own distinct personalities. An experience that was both blissful and stressful, but ultimately rewarding, provided priceless opportunities for further growth and discernment, self-discoveries that tested our faith, purpose, and commitment to the Lord, community socials and road trips that provided precious bonding time with the fathers and brothers who came before us as formators and superiors, and fellow postulants whom we have come to love as our own brothers. It was a wonderful opportunity to share our talents, which ranged from gardening and sports to cooking and baking, flower arrangement, art and design, medicine, and music. And when one of us seemed to lack confidence in manual labor, singing, writing, or speaking, it was an opportunity to encourage each of us to try harder and improve ourselves. For us, the Assumption Parish served as the first model of parish life, where we were officially accepted as postulants by Fr. Leo Ayuyao; the setting of beautiful encounters with loyal, kind, and generous parishioners and members of nearby religious communities who have become our dear friends, confidantes, and benefactors; and the place where we first served as lectors and sacristans at church and in other congregations such as the RVM and PDDM, in GKK masses and Legion of Mary apostolates.

Many members of our Davao community came and went during our postulancy; some became very close to us, were instrumental in our formation, and left a significant imprint on our ongoing vocation stories; but, like the seminarians who came before us, we journey on to the next phase of our own formation, hoping that our vocation will lead us to where the Lord wants us to be, in a way that we ourselves do not know exactly. As I prepare to enter the novitiate, I remember Thomas Merton's prayer: "My Lord God, I have no idea where I am going. I can't see the path ahead of me. I don't know where it will end, nor do I really know myself, and just because I think I'm doing what you want doesn't mean I'm doing it. But I believe that the desire to please you is gratifying. And I hope that desire pervades everything I do. I hope I never do anything other than what I want. And I know that if I do this, despite my lack of knowledge, you will lead me in the right direction. As a result, even if I appear to be lost and dying, I will always trust you. I will not be afraid because you are always with me and will never leave me to face my perils alone." May this prayer serve as an inspiration to those who come after us, so that they, too, can find meaning in this calm before the storm, as we did as postulants.
